## Words with two syllables that end with the letters 'le' that have a single vowel

If the 'le' word has three consonants prior to the final letter ' $\mathbf{e}$ ' as in the words 'bubble' and 'single' and 'whistle, and if there is a single vowel in the word, as there is in all these words, the vowel will sound as a 'short' vowel. This means it will sound as it does in the lower case alphabet, 'a' as in apple, 'e' as in egg, 'i' as in igloo, 'o' as in orange and ' $\mathbf{u}$ ' as in umbrella.

If the word ending in 'le' has two consonants prior to the 'e' as in the words 'able' and' bugle' the vowel will often sound as its 'long' vowel sound, which is its name sound, $\mathbf{A}, \mathbf{E}, \mathbf{I}, \mathbf{0}$, and $\mathbf{U}$.

And if the letter ' $y$ ' is being used as a vowel and it is followed by two consonants it sounds as the capital letter 'I' as in the word 'cycle'.
